The U.S. Integrated Ocean Observing System (IOOS) is a program within the NOAA National Ocean Service to produce, integrate, and communicate high quality ocean and Great Lakes information that meets the safety, economic, and stewardship needs of the Nation. The observing and data management infrastructure is implemented through 11 federally-certified non-federal partners (Regional Associations) who provide actionable, near real time (and retrospective) data, as well as tools and forecasts, that are tailored to the needs of local and regional users while also supporting and enhancing federal models, forecasts, and information products. IOOS supports safe and efficient maritime transportation and commerce, U.S. Coast Guard search and rescue operations, offshore energy development and operations, resource management and protection, environmental prediction (e.g., marine heat waves), improved understanding and notification of hazards (e.g., hurricanes and flooding), and more. The Regional Associations regularly engage and collaborate with multi-sector partners, local communities - including Indigenous communities, Tribes, and other overburdened frontline groups - to understand their needs and to co-develop tailored observing activities, data products, and services to support planning and decision-making.

We enthusiastically endorse the valuable data and services provided by the IOOS Regional Associations. We fully support sustaining these observing systems so they continue the delivery of important data products and services upon which diverse partners and users have come to rely.
